Is there a s itable ratio of staff to residents d ring the da, at night, and at eekends?	
Can residents choose if the ha e a male or female carer?	
Ho are staff trained, ho often and b hom?

Are all staff trained in caring for residents ith dementia, if necessar ?	
Do the staff ha e care q ali cations?	
Is there a high staff t rno er? (If so, this co ld be a sign of lo staff morale.)

Do staff ha e e perience of caring for an partic lar health conditions?	
Do residents ha e a named member of staff ho is partic larl responsible for their care?	
Are residents and their families in ol ed in decisions abo t their care?	
Do residents seem to ha e a similar le el of need to o ?	
If o r needs change or increase, can the still be met in the same home?	
Do the bathroom facilities meet or needs?	
Are accessible toilets a ailable and eas to get to?	
Are residents helped to the toilet, if needed?	П

Wo ld o ha e to share a bathroom or bedroom?	
Can residents choose hether the ha e a bath or sho er, and ho often?	
Is there a mi of female and male residents?

Are there facilities s ch as: a radio, a reading room, a TV room, ne spapers, books or a mobile librar, a p blic phone, shared comp ters, internet, and hairdressing ser ices?	

Are there reg lar social acti ities s ch as: m sic ox singing, reminiscence gro ps, e ercise classes, gardening, celebrations for special occasions,

Set pan rele antempt ho se co er	
Sort out what you'll bring with you

Arrange for an n anted items to be sold or donated	
Arrange storage for things o ant to keep that o aren't bringing ith o	
Make necessary arrangements	
Ask someone to collect an post for o	
Cancel or amend an reg lar deli eries, s ch as meals or milk
